Double-Glazed Partitions

The double-walled partitions of Padiran are executed in Three main families, D, Slim & Limak.



Slim Double Glazed Patition

This type of single-wall partition uses a very special aluminum structure with a cross-sectional area of 40×28 mm, which due to the double layer of its 10 mm glass, greatly helps to absorb or prevent the passage of sound through it.

Slim double wall model partition is also applicable in vintage slim, slim with light, and slim frameless models.

Currently, the Slim double-walled partition, as its name implies (Slim means narrow), is the narrowest structure of the double-walled partition and is a very suitable option for places that need a narrow partition in two layers of glass for more comfort.



The double-walled partitions of Padiran are executed in two main families, Di and Slim. The Di model has two models: simple and shutter.


Double-walled partitions, like other partition models, have an aluminum structure but have a cross-sectional area of 80 x 28 mm, which is covered with electrostatic powder paint (in various colors).


The glass of this partition is super clear and 10 mm thick and has diamond edges.

In general, in the model of double-walled partition, various other families can be designed and implemented, which are known as Di-Di Frame Less - Di Vintage- Di Frame Less with Light.


















Good design is obvious. Great design is transparent.



Air quality can suffer if a building, or part of a building, has insufficient outdoor air. Opening windows and not depending on the air conditioning may be an obvious way to improve air quality in a workspace. However, this can significantly disrupt temperature and humidity, causing high energy losses, and may also let carbon dioxide or other pollutants into the workspace. Air conditioning systems do deliver air changes to match designed occupancy, and this air is filtered. Building users produce carbon monoxide, and levels should be monitored as too much can lead to lethargy and less productivity



An intentional office design can aid in providing a soothing, comforting experience for those returning to in-person work. Showcasing artwork that evokes calming sensations or gives employees a sense of place can help ease the transition. In fact, 92 percent of people say art installations elicit positive feedback.




Its Its structure is an iron stud structure with a powder coating baked in a furnace. To install it, it must be placed in the ground, ceiling or wall groove beforehand.

In the design of partition D with a cross-section of 28 * 80 mm, a depression is created in the upper part and this feature, depending on the design and choice of buyers, can be the location of the secondary aluminum belt in the same color as the main profile, MDF and even lighting profile or can be colorless.

By means of a type of profile that is placed in the upper part of double-walled or single-walled partitions, if necessary, the partitions can be designed and executed shorter from floor to ceiling height.



One design idea to fix both of these problems is to build in several small meeting spaces along the edges of the office. Stick with the open feel by giving them soundproof glass walls. The rooms don't need to be very large – just enough to hold five or six people comfortably for an impromptu meeting. Soundproof walls keep the other workers from getting distracted, and several small rooms allow for groups to meet whenever they need to.


Acoustics also play a big part in work space stress. If you work in a noisy office, consider adding rugs, acoustic panels around desks, or replacing the ceiling tiles with sound absorbent systems. Consider moving the loudest workers away from other staff.






Tying together systems for managing space utilization and energy consumption will enable companies to hibernate underutilized space; for example, rendering overflow workspace unavailable for booking until other areas are fully occupied. Another example is consolidating bookings of sequential similarly sized meetings into a single meeting room, rather than allowing reservations to be made for rooms located on various floors, thus minimizing climatization needs.



You have to know what makes you tick, what hurts, and what helps keep you focused. Once you understand what may be holding you back or what could be pushing you to perform better, you can begin designing your work space for productivity. When thinking through any changes, just keep in mind pain reduction, stress reduction, and personalization, and you are sure to be well on your way to a more productive work area.





Limak Partitions

In this type of partition, first, metal structure with a width of 8 cm is installed as a structure at the workplace and its fillers are added to it with a thickness of 16 mm from the outer surface of the structure, which increases its width to 11 cm.

Fillers for this type of partition include 16 mm MDF of different colors and glass frames.

These glass frames are actually special aluminum frames that hold 6 mm glass inside.


Note: In cases where it is needed, you can use MDF filler instead of glass in single-wall mono and double-wall partitions.

In the single-wall model, 25 mm MDF can be used inside the partition. These fillers are usually used in the body of silent rooms or in special dividers that have Fabric upholstery.







Predicting the future of work is tough, but planning for it based on past history and current trends is somewhat easier.


